Terry E. Brown was born in Columbus, Georgia, raised in a military family, and spent a good portion of his childhood overseas. He graduated from AFCENT Brunssum International High School in the Netherlands in 1987 and returned to the United States to further his education at Grambling State University in Louisiana. He graduated from the University in 1992 with a degree in Criminal Justice.

Terry E. Brown is a 26-year veteran of the National Park Service (NPS).

Currently, he serves as Superintendent of Fort Monroe National Monument. Prior to that, Terry served more than five years as Site Manager of Boston African American National Historic Site.

Among his many accomplishments during his tenure in Boston, Terry is particularly proud of the lasting relationships he built with nonprofit and community organizations, developing a motivated and engaged staff, and being a member of the management team for the \$9.5-million-dollar historic restoration of the African Meeting House.

Terry's career with NPS began at Upper Delaware Scenic & Recreational River. He also served as an Interpretive Park Ranger at Independence National Historic Site from May 1992-2004 and as a Supervisory Park Ranger at National Mall & Memorial Parks from 2004-2008. Additionally, he detailed as Site Manager at Old Post Office Tower in 2007, as Chief of Interpretation and Education at Delaware Water Gap National Recreation Area in 2008, as Superintendent of Springfield Armory National Historic Site in 2011, and as Chief of Interpretation and Education at Boston National Historical Park in 2014.

Terry is the recipient of several NPS awards and honors, including the Outstanding Service Award for 2004 Federal Executive Board of Excellence in Government with category of Improved Federal Image and a recent graduate of the National Superintendent Academy.

Terry graduated from AFCENT Brunssum International High School in 1987 and furthered his education at Grambling State University earning a bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice in 1992.

The opportunity to serve as superintendent of a NPS site has been a personal goal of Terry's since his early days in management. He's currently serves on the 2019 Virginia State Commission recognizing 400 Years of African American History and the Board of Academies of Hampton.
